1. Introduction

Papers should be in English and between 3.000 and 4.000 words in length, including references. The paper must be submitted in a Microsoft Word.doc file before 1 September 2026 via email at conference@bcthubs.eu.

2. Heading

This is an indicative layout of the different sections of the paper. Introduction, discussion and conclusions are expected.

You are requested to use this template keeping the layout, formation and styles (fonts, spacing and margins: Times New Roman, size 12, line & paragraph spacing 1,15, regular margins (2.54cm above/below, 2.54cm right/left). From one to nine use letters not numbers (the same for adjectives, i.e. first). Numerals and letter suffixes for centuries are given without superscript (e.g. 5th cent. B.C.). Please use: for numbers i.e. 1,000; for dates i.e. 1000 B.C.; and for dimensions 20 cm./20 m².

SPECIAL WORDING AND PHRASES

Only words or phrases that do not constitute common terminology are put in italics. Common words / phrases in Latin, such as terminus post quem, passim, in situ, are not written in italics.

Capitalize the first letter of chronological periods: e.g. Mycenaean, Archaic, Classical, etc. The same applies in the case of adjectives: e.g. Mycenaean vessels.

You can use American-English or British-English but keep consistency throughout the text.

2.1. Subsection

Footnotes¹ can be inserted, however, please avoid referring to a specific page number in the text (as this will change). Abbreviations and acronyms must be explained when initially utilized and must then be used consistently throughout the text.

Lists can be either in bullets or numbered in the following styles:

- first;
- second.

2.1.1. Subsection

Maximum number of illustrations: 15.

Figures, graphs and tables should be embedded in the document with a centered caption below including the source, i.e. credits or copyrights/permissions as appropriate (unless credit is provided elsewhere, e.g. within the image or in a note). and following continuous numbering. Within the text, all figures and tables should be cited as 1 (Fig. 1), (Table 1), etc. Illustrations are numbered by the author (consecutive numbering: Fig. 1, Fig. 2, Fig. 3 etc.). If an image consists of two parts, its numbering may be further defined as follows: Fig. 10 a, Fig. 10 b.

Images and drawings: Digital files are numbered and submitted separately in TIFF or Jpeg format. At a resolution of 300 dpi at print size. The captions of the numbered images/drawings are to be submitted in a word file.

Maps and topographical material: All names, markings, etc. must be clear. The maximum print size is A4. Any information that is not legible can be incorporated into the caption.

Each image must be also sent in attachment in a separate file, in .jpg and/or .tiff format, at a resolution of 300 dpi at print size.

References

References follow the APA 7th Edition referencing style system.

For Non-English Language Sources

Cite the version of the work you used; if you used the English translation, cite this version.

If you use a non-English work, cite the author, date, title and source of the work in the original language. You must include an English translation of the title in square brackets, directly after the title and before the full stop.

If the work uses a non-Latin alphabet (e.g., Arabic, Farsi, Mandarin, Japanese, Russian) an extra step is required. Non-Latin alphabets are not used in the reference list in APA Style, so the title needs to be transliterated (that is, converted to the alphabet you are using to write the paper). This is followed by the English translation, in square brackets. For in-text citations, they must be provided in Latin alphabet.

References in the text

In the text, references follow the format (Author, year, page number, Fig. number) for one author, (Author & Author, year, page number) for two authors and (Author et al., year) for three or more authors.

For multiple works by the same author use full stop (e.g. Bass 1966. 1967. 1982).

Separate successive references with full stop.

Bibliographical References

The reference list should be in alphabetical order. Here are some examples:
